



Take me seriously and treat me fairly; Include me in decisions that affect me; Collaborate with me to solve problems and reach goals; Create opportunities for me to take action and lead.


<u>5. Expand Possibilities:</u> Connect me with people and places that broaden my world

OHIO MODEL UNITED NATIONS

Thirty-five Benjamin Logan High School students participated in the Ohio Model United Nations three-day global education simulation experience held in Columbus, OH in November. The students learned about the complete operations of the United Nations and its role as the world's largest international peacekeeping and humanitarian organization. The students become delegates of a selected nation in order to write, present and debate issues affecting the nations and peoples of the world. Through role-playing, the students presented culturally based talent, participated in global education contests and debated current issues from the agenda of the United Nations.









State Testing

There are many new requirements for state testing for all students in grades 9-11 this year. They include:

Classes of 2018 and beyond: End-of-course tests in English Language Arts I and II, Algebra I, Geometry, Biology or Physical Science (class of 2018 only), American History and American Government. Students must attain a total of 18 points on these tests. Each test is a maximum of 5 points. Also, students must earn at least 4 points in Math (Algebra I and Geometry), 4 points in English (ELA I & II), and 6 points between Social Studies and Science (Biology, American History, and American Government.)

The state of Ohio is now also requiring schools to administer ACT to all juniors. We will be giving ACT to all juniors on March 21st. This test can also fulfill graduation requirements, if students earn a minimum of 18 in English and 22 in Math. Juniors must have a reading subscore of 21 or higher, and freshmen and sophomores must have a reading subscore of 22 or higher.

Seniors are still required to pass OGT.

MONEY MATTERS

Financial Sharing with CFO/Treasurer Mandy France:



Thank you for the opportunity to bring you information related to the cost to educate students at Benjamin Logan. Being the CFO/Treasurer it is my responsibility to inform our stakeholders and help them gain knowledge as it relates to the future success with our students and community.

In October I had the privilege to present the five year financial forecast to the Board of Education and our stakeholders. During that update I shared that we are different from what was shared twelve months ago and we are headed in a direction that represents our district pledge of Every STUDENT, Every Day. The presentation was based on a realistic picture of where we stood at that snapshot in time. To view the forecast you can go to our

district website at www.benjaminlogan.org select the resources tab, Treasurer Page and the five year forecast will be available for you to review.

With the leadership of Mr. Harmon our district is investing in a planned education initiative that is taking place for the next several years. We are currently in year one of this movement and the "buzz" of the excitement of learning is very alive and contagious. We are funding the initiative by utilizing one time cash balance reserves. The planned spending of this educational initiative is \$360,000 in each of the first three years and then stabilization funds are allocated to continue this new educational process of \$100,000 each year thereafter.

STEM Day by Jill Hughes, BLES Technology Teacher

On November 10th, Benjamin Logan Schools hosted the 2nd Annual "Using STEM to Bloom" event for 45 girls in grades 3-5. STEM is an acronym for Science, Technology, Engineering and Math. The aim of "Using STEM to Bloom" is to help girls realize their aptitude, excitement, and abilities within these fields.

Using funds from a Honda sponsorship, the girls traveled to the the Honda Heritage Center and Technical Development Center in the morning. The girls took a tour of the museum and then had a scavenger hunt to complete. They experienced some of the hands-on activities like the race car game and trying to animate a video version of Asimo

> (the robot). In the Technical Development Center, the girls got to experience "welding" and "car painting" in a virtual reality environment. They also were able to watch a giant robot arm write a word as the engineers explained how they program the robots.

Upon returning to campus, the Women in Engineering (WIN)

group from Honda joined us for lunch and afternoon activities. The students had the opportunity to work with Honda engineersspecifically women engineers- in small groups.

The afternoon activities included: learning about crash test dummies, creating a "vehicle" to protect an egg as it was dropped from different

heights and a catapult building challenge where the girls worked in groups with common objects (plastic spoons, rubber bands, popsicle sticks, etc.)

to build and test a catapult. They also explored real vehicles and various car building materials

in a "show and tell" environment that Honda engineers brought to the school campus.

It was a wonderful opportunity for the girls to meet and work with women working in STEM related jobs. According to the Commerce Department, women hold less than a quarter of all STEM jobs despite making

up nearly half of the U.S. workforce and half of all college-educated American workers. By engaging girls at a young age, we hope to encourage them to pursue careers in STEM related fields.

The teachers that planned and organized the event were Jill Hughes, Elementary Technology teacher, Amy McCormick, Gifted Intervention Specialist and Amanda Davis, Gifted Intervention Specialist.







Dolly Parton Imagination Library arrives in Logan County

Local organizations partner to provide free books for preschoolers

If you have a child under the age of five in Logan County, you can now enroll them for free in Dolly Parton's Imagination Library. They will receive a free book in the mail every month until their fifth birthday!

Visit www.uwlogan.org or www.imaginationlibrary.com to register. Your child's first book will arrive in six to eight weeks. Children can accumulate a free library of up to 60 books and develop the skills necessary to be ready for school. This program mails a new, age-appropriate book every month to each child enrolled in the program until their fifth birthday.

Studies from other communities around the country show that children enrolled in the Imagination Library are better prepared for kindergarten, have a larger vocabulary, spend more time reading with parents and guardians, have more books, and visit the library more often than children not enrolled.

"I am very excited to see the positive results and future impact that early childhood reading will have on our incoming students at Benjamin Logan Schools." said Sally Stolly, Benjamin Logan Schools Curriculum Director. "Reading books to children is a priceless gift that takes only a little time each day, but will influence your little ones for life," said Ariel Harris, Children's Librarian for the Logan County Libraries.

Mrs. Bodin, Principal at Benjamin Logan Elementary, has been excited to be a part of helping bring the Dolly Parton Imagination Library to Logan County. To help with the kickoff event in November, she read to over 150 preschool children around the country encouraging them to sign up.

The Dolly Parton Imagination Library has been in existence since 1995. Founded by Dolly Parton for the children in her hometown of Sevier County, the program has spread across the country through the help of committed community partners. It is now available in Logan County thanks to the financial support of local sponsors, including United Way of Logan County, the Lewis & Dorothy Tamplin Trust, Bellefontaine Rotary Club, Vectren Foundation, Belletech Corporation, Logan County Libraries, PNC, and local individuals who are combining to invest over \$150,000 in early childhood literacy over the next five years.

Testing Update

In early November, every 3rd grade student took the Ohio AIR English Language Arts and Reading test. These tests are now fully computer based testing and require multiple skills from our children including reading, making answer choices, typing responses and, in general, navigating around the computer. We look forward to receiving these results and finding better ways to assist our children.

This fall, all of our kindergarten through 4th grade students took the NWEA Map test. These results were shared with parents during fall conferences. We use this information to better instruct our students as it provided a wealth of information on what skills your child is already doing well and also areas in which they can improve. Our students will take these tests again in January. We lookforward to seeing how much knowledge they have already gained this year.

Kindergarten Readiness Assessment- KRA

Every Kindergarten student is required to take the KRA during the first few weeks of school. Our results state that 46% of our incoming kindergarten students are not prepared for Kindergarten.

Kindergarten teacher Mrs. Kyra Fry shared that "administering the test gives me the opportunity to work one on one with my students and get to know them early in the year. I can have a conservation with them and we start to form a bond from the start." As we get to know our students and work to use our data, we begin intervention early in the year to try and close the achievement gap.



The PTC has many fun events planned in the New Year as well. The skate parties will resume with one on Wednesday, January 12th. There will be several events, including a Dolly and Me Unbirthday Party and a Family Superhero event in the upcoming months. The PTC will also help to bring a visiting author to the school.
